DID YOU GET A NOOK OR KINDLE FOR THE HOLIDAYS?

Did you get an e-reader for Christmas or Hanukkah? If so, you'll want to use the e-resources available through the Nassau Digital Doorway to download books to your Kindle, Nook, Sony eReader, iPad or other compatible mobile device. A listing of compatible devices is included on the the Nassau Digital Doorway's website).

The Glen Cove Library continues to expand its collection of ebook titles available; we now have over 5,000 titles available for download, including best sellers, book club favorites, classics and more! Simply browse and select from a variety of great fiction and non-fiction titles for readers of all ages, download them to your computer and transfer them to your portable device for your enjoyment anywhere, anytime! There are also over 3,000 audiobook titles available through the Nassau Digital Doorway,

which you can listen to on a computer, iPod, or using MP3 players that support Windows Media Audio files.

Although these books are digital copies, they are checked out just like regular hardcover books – but there are no late fees! You don't have to worry about returning it – at the end of the borrowing period the books will expire and be automatically returned to the digital collection. And if a title you'd like is checked out, place a request for it and you'll be notified by email when your copy is available.

FEBRUARY IS AFRICAN AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH

African American History Month commemorates the contributions that African Americans have made to American history in their struggles for freedom and equality and deepens our understanding of our Nation's history. National African American History Month had its origins in 1915 when historian and author Dr. Carter G. Woodson founded the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History. This organization is now known as the Association for the Study of African American Life and History (ASALH). Through this organization, Dr. Woodson initiated the first Negro History Week in February 1926. Dr. Woodson selected the week in February that included the birthdays of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass, two key figures in the history of African Americans. In 1976, the Association used its influence to shift the celebration from a week to a month and from Negro history to Black history.

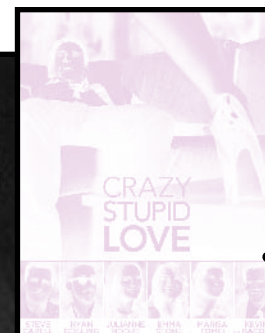

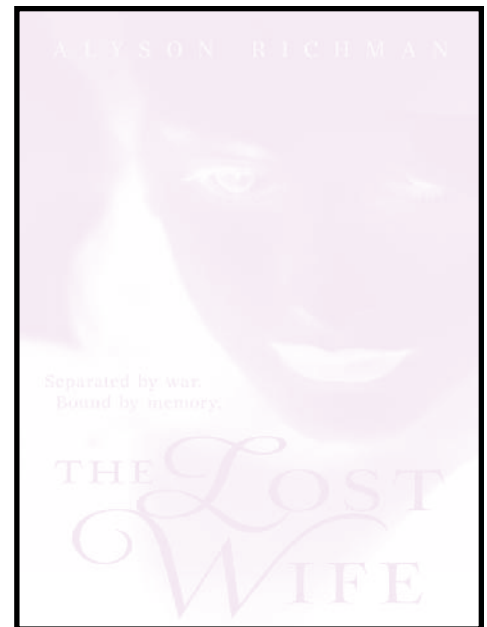

GO MOBILE WITH GLEN COVE LIBRARY! SIGN UP FOR SMS ALERTS!

SMS Alerts provide you with mobile text messages to inform you when an item is coming due, overdue or when requested items are available for pick up. To sign up for SMS Alerts, log into your Library account at www.alisweb.org, and click on "Modify Personal Info." Enter your mobile phone number and click on the link to opt in. Check the "Opt In" box, scroll down the page and click submit. You will then be sent a text message, to which you must reply in order to receive alerts on your device. You may opt out at any time by logging into your Library account and modifying your information or by replying "Stop" on your mobile device when you receive a text message. Should you need any assistance in setting up this useful service, our Reference Librarians will be glad to assist you.

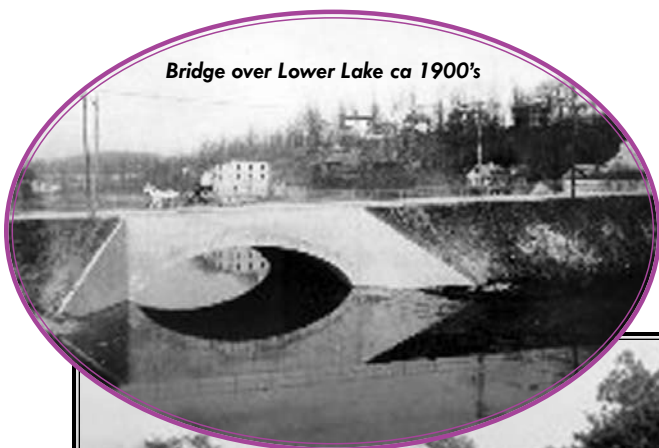
INTERESTING HISTORY/TRIVIA FACTS ABOUT GLEN COVE by Robert Coles

Happy New Year! As another year passes a new one begins. How much do you really know about the origins of Glen Cove? Uncanny facts, unusual information, bits and pieces of miscellany have been accumulated throughout the years. Uncommon knowledge that's fun to read, and might be useful in conversations is among the many fascinating items you will find in the Robert R. Coles Long Island History Collection. Come browse the collection!

WOULD YOU BELIEVE THAT

1. Much of the present Village of Sea Cliff was included in the original Musketa Cove purchase?
2. The Dosoris area, including Morgan's Island, was not part of the Musketa Cove purchase?
3. All the territory occupied by the City of Glen Cove, and much land beyond, was called "Matinecock" during much of the 17th century and for many years after that time?
4. Several residents of Sea Cliff wished to have their village annexed to Glen Cove when it became a city, in 1918?
5. Pearsall Avenue was once called "Rattlesnake Hollow?"
6. Many years ago some of our private estates had their own trout ponds?
7. A little brook flowing parallel with the present School Street was once called "Killbuck Brook?"
8. The first district school in Musketa Cove began as early as 1788?
9. During the Civil War the intersection of Cottage Row and the present School St. was named "Union Square?"
10. There are three railroad stations in Glen Cove – the Sea Cliff Station, the Glen Cove Glen Street Station, and the Glen Cove Station?
11. The little pond on the property of the Nassau Country Club was once called "Swan Lake?"
12. During the early years of Musketa Cove, Town Path was the most important highway leading into the community?
13. After the settlement of Musketa Cove fifty seven years passed before any house of public worship was built?
14. No vehicular bridge crossed the pond area of Glen Cove until about 1902. Roads crossed at the milldams and there was a foot-bridge north of Continental Place?
15. About a century ago the present Landing Road was called "Main Street?"
