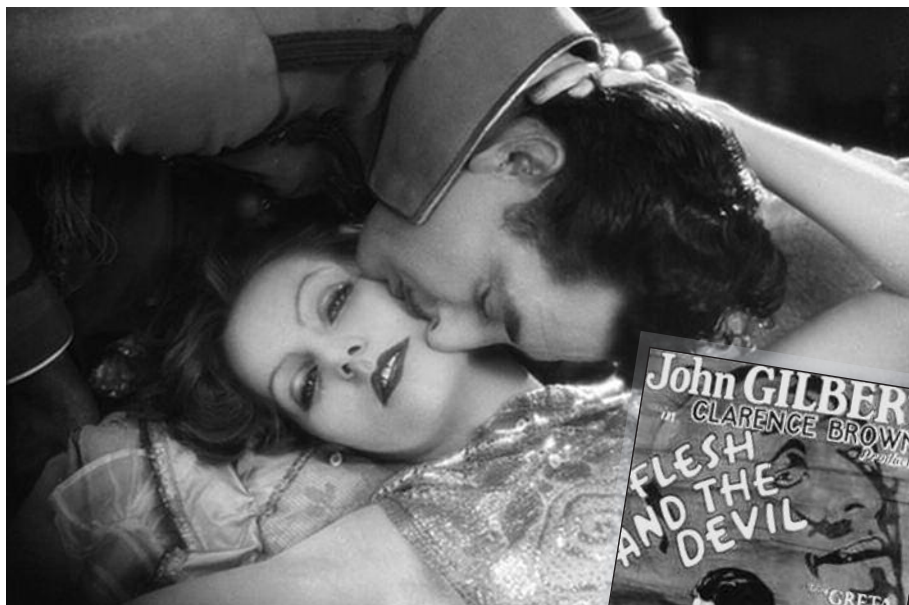

QUALIFICATIONS FOR VOTING

Registration is required only if a resident has not voted in a Hewlett-Woodmere Union Free School District or Library referendum within the last 4 years or in a general referendum within the last 4 years. In order to be eligible to register, you must be a U.S. citizen, 18 years of age or older by Tuesday, April 3, 2012, and you must have been a legal resident of the H-W UFSD for at least 30 days prior to the referendum. **Registration for voting takes place Tuesday, March 27, 2012, 1 pm - 9 pm in the Library.**

When he arrives, he learns that Felicitas has married Ulrich. Leo tries to stay away from Felicitas and Ulrich, which hurts and puzzles Ulrich. But Felicitas has other plans and pursues Leo. Ulrich's sister Hertha (Barbara Kent) tries to save her brother and his beloved friend, Leo, from disaster.

New York Cabaret Unlimited has been performing for over 19 years. The group consists of four singers (two men, two women), a narrator, a bassist, and a pianist /arranger. They will present songs by Frank Loesser, blended into a narration depicting highlights from the composers' life and challenges faced as an artist.

Frank Loesser wrote scores for over 60 films for Paramount and Universal Pictures. His first published song was "In Love with the Memory of You" in collaboration with William Schuman. After WW II, he wrote "Where's Charlie", based on the play, *Charlie's Aunt*. This was followed up by *Guys and Dolls*, which swept the Tony Awards in 1950. Returning to Hollywood, he wrote the score for *Hans Christian Andersen*. Then back to Broadway with *The Most Happy Fella* followed by *How to Succeed Business Without Really Trying*, which won the Pulitzer Prize for Drama, 7 Tony Awards, and a New York Drama Circle Award in 1961.

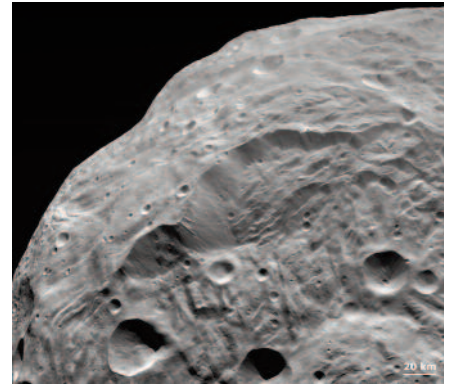

eBooks and Audiobooks Online

With Sharper Training

Learn how to download eBooks and audiobooks from the library's website to your eReader or MP3 player. In this class, you will learn how to access the collection of books, create a username and password, maneuver around the website, download books, work with your eReader or MP3 player, and more. The major e-readers – *iPad*, *Sony Reader*, *B&N Nook*, *Kindle* (and the *Fire*), the library's website and Nassau Digital Doorway will be discussed. If you do not have a device, you can still learn a lot from this program for your future use.

eBooks at the Library

Patrons of the Hewlett-Woodmere Public Library now have anytime, anywhere access to a dynamic collection of digital audio books and eBooks through the Nassau Digital Doorway.

Patrons can check out up to five titles at a time and at the end of the loan period, the audio books or eBooks will automatically expire and return to the Nassau Digital Doorway collection. The digital titles have no late fees or damage costs. The service is free, easy-to-use, and available 24/7 from anywhere in the world.

With your HWPL card, you have access to over 8,000 purchased titles and 15,000 public domain titles. There is also digital online book access to almost 700 Disney titles.

Kindle support has recently been added for most eBooks in addition to the *Nook* and many other eBook readers.

The Library will be offering two sessions on accessing eBooks and Audiobooks Online in February (see above) and downloading to the *Kindle* (even the *Fire*), *Nook*, *Sony Reader*, *iPad*, and others.

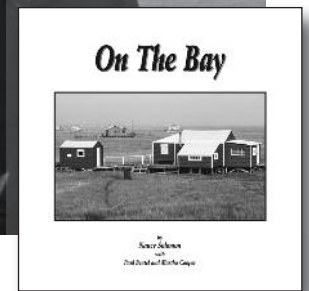

On The Bay
by Nancy Solomon
Long Island Traditions

■ **Thursday, February 9, 1 pm**

On The Bay is a book on the bay houses within the Town of Hempstead. Written by Nancy Solomon, executive director of Long Island Traditions, the book documents the architecture of these unique structures originally built by baymen, fishermen and duck hunters in the early 19th century for shelter while clamming, fishing, harvesting salt hay or duck hunting. During the early 20th century the houses were used by commercial duck hunters until it was outlawed in 1917, and by rum runners, who smuggled liquor to the nearby shores during Prohibition. In the 1950s and early 1960s recreational fishermen and sportsmen built dozens of the small structure, using the same designs as their predecessors. In 1965 the Town removed most of the bay houses in order to preserve the fragile wetlands.

In 1991 the Town of Hempstead moved to preserve the last remaining bay houses. The 2nd edition of this book documents the traditions of those who first built the modest houses, and contains historic and contemporary photographs by noted photographer Martha Cooper. It also includes a new preface and introduction, along with some updated photographs.

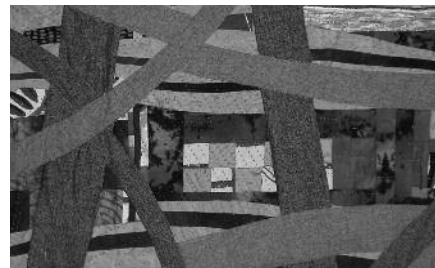

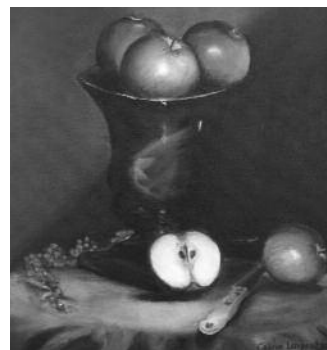

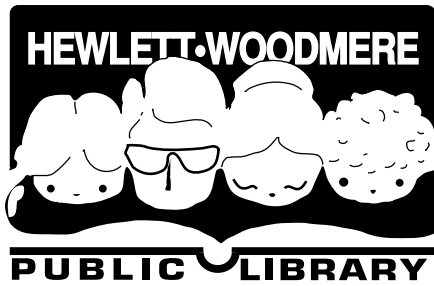
