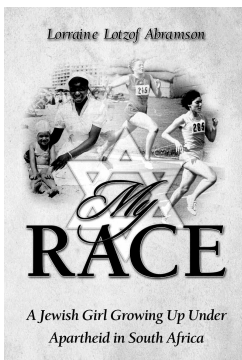
MEET AUTHOR LORRAINE LOTZOF ABRAMSON

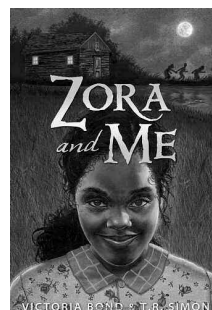

RELEVANCY OF HISTORICAL ART OBJECTS TODAY

Wednesday, April 6, at 1PM

This illustrated lecture examines current events surrounding historical works of art. From the earthquake damaged proto-renaissance frescoes in Assisi, to the recent cleaning controversy surrounding the Sistine Chapel, to the art theft at the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum, Professor Germano addresses historic art in the relevant and present age.



LEONARDO DA VINCI: NEW DISCOVERIES

This illustrated lecture, led by art historian Louise Caruso, will highlight the artistic genius of Johannes Vermeer. An artist who excelled in the depiction of form and light, his works are shrouded in mystery. This lecture will help us interpret and clarify his masterpieces.

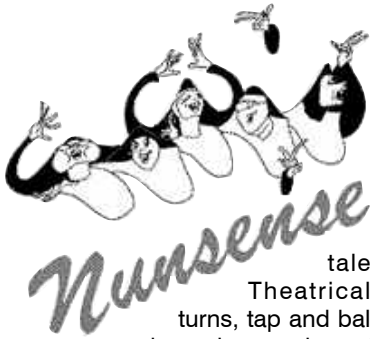

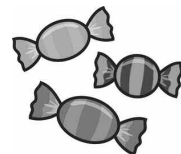

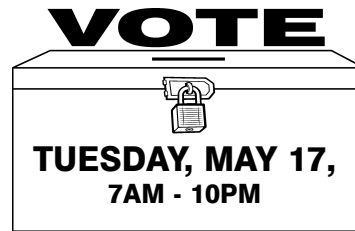
